Survey Series – City Clerks' Office Information

The Center for Municipal Research conducted a survey of 292 municipal clerks in Florida regarding how the city clerk's office is structured in their municipalities. The survey was conducted electronically from October 22 – November 15, 2019, with a response rate of 75% or 219 clerks.

Key Take-Aways

Of municipal clerks who responded:

- All but one city has the position of city clerk (99.5%)
- 45% of cities have the position of deputy clerk
- More than 75% of city clerks report being responsible for additional job duties beyond the traditional scope of the city clerk position.
- 90% of cities have 5 or less employees in the clerk's office
- 47% of cities designate the authority to hire/fire the city clerk to the city council/commission while
 39% designate that authority to the city manager and 8% designate that authority to a combination of both
- **30%** of cities designate the authority to hire/fire employees within the city clerk's office to either the city clerk or the city manager/administrator while **27%** designate that authority to the city clerk only and **27%** designate that authority to the city manager/administrator only
